### **The Power of THREE CUPS OF TEA** **Submitted by Shannon Davies**

On February 10th nine Mosaicans who had been inspired by the book THREE CUPS OF TEA, drove to Vero Beach to hear the author, Greg Mortenson, speak - and we were not disappointed!

The event, hosted by the Vero Beach UU Fellowship, was well organized, the Emerson Center was full to capacity, and Mortenson was generous in giving us 90 minutes of his time. He shared his amazing story and many photos of his work in Pakistan and Afghanistan facilitating the building of 78 schools. A short film was shown, narrated by his 12 year-old daughter, Amira, telling more about the **Pennies for Peace** program which has been started in more than 3,000 schools and organizations.

We were all impressed by how genuine Mortenson seems and how modest he is about his many accomplishments. Next month he is being awarded the Star of Pakistan in Islamabad in recognition of the work he has been doing for children (especially girls) and communities in remote and troubled areas. He has also been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, and he certainly has my vote because education is the most effective way to eliminate ignorance and illiteracy which are the breeding grounds for violence and terrorism. Particularly gratifying to us was hearing that U.S. Generals Petraes and Mullen have been in contact with him, learning from his experience, realizing that a military approach is not the solution to the problems of the region, but diplomacy, listening, and drinking more tea with the people. Three Cups of Tea is now required reading at the Pentagon.

"The mission of CAI focuses on community-based education, especially for girls. A 5th grade education for girls improves not only the basic indices of health for her and her family, she will also spread the value of education within her community. Literacy, for both boys and girls, provides better economic opportunities in the future and neutralizes the power of despot mullahs and other extremist leaders." Since school children were the first to understand the power of a penny, making the first donations to CAI, the **Pennies for Peace** project was launched to educate children about the world beyond their experience, showing them they can make a positive impact on a global scale, one penny at a time. A penny in the U.S. is virtually worthless, but in Pakistan and Afghanistan a penny buys a pencil and opens the door to literacy.

As Greg Mortenson's work speaks to our Unitarian Universalist principles, Mosaic is starting a **Pennies for Peace** project. We will have a jar available for members and visitors to contribute at our various services and gatherings. Mortenson's work proves that one person can make a difference, and we can all take part in lighting a candle (or chalice) in order to make our world a better place for all of us. We strongly encourage you to read THREE CUPS OF TEA. There are copies in the Mosaic library.

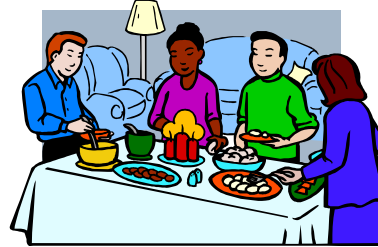
## **FEBRUARY INAUGURATION CELEBRATION POT LUCK Submitted by Judy Raymond**

## March Action of the Month: Sexuality Education Call-In Days

from UUA Justice Action Network

Support the interfaith delegation at the Sexuality Education Advocacy Training (SEAT) March 21- 24 as Unitarian Universalist youth and adults lobby their representatives in Washington, DC, to pass the Responsible Education About Life (REAL) Act, soon to be introduced into the 111th Congress. REAL will provide funding to states for medically accurate, age appropriate, comprehensive sexuality education in public schools that includes information about abstinence *and* contraception from both values-based and public health perspectives.

Call the Capitol Switchboard at (202) 224-3121 for the House of Representative or (202) 225-3121 for the Senate and ask for your representative's or senators' office. While you're calling, SEAT participants will be visiting members of congress, and your calls add strength and numbers to their message!

Opportunities for Further Action:

- \*Form an ongoing sexuality education advocacy group in your congregation, campus group or community.
- \*Partner with groups in your community and state.
- \*Investigate what type of sex ed programs are provided in your local schools or community.
- \*Educate your community about these issues by hosting a forum or a movie night with films such as: "The Education of Shelby Knox" and "Abstinence Comes to Albuquerque."

### **UUA FL DISTRICT ANNUAL ASSEMBLY** **MARCH 20-22, SARASOTA** ***ECONOMIC JUSTICE***

Check-in begins on **Friday** night at **4pm**, followed by a reception, dinner, worship, and an evening social time.

**Saturday** begins with breakfast and worship, followed by the keynote speech by Dr. Charlie Clements, President an CEO of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee, and a short business meeting. ## **Reflections on Our Core Ministries -3rd in an Occasional Series by Rev. Kenn Hurto**

"What is the faithful response to these times?" a colleague asked recently.

Individually and as congregations, this is not an idle speculation. The deepening recession -- its personal and cultural impacts -- and our reactions or responses to it go to the core of our being, our hopes and our fears. What does it mean? How to I cope? Where will it lead? What does it say about our society? Can I ask for help? Can I offer help to others? Big and not readily answered questions.

I no longer use "religious education" to describe one of our core ministries, although we still do educate religiously. Instead, I reframe what we're trying to do as "spiritual discernment." Others prefer the phrase "faith development." The difference lies in the focus: "RE" suggests someone has a curriculum of knowledge and values to impart to learners. "Discernment" and "development" suggest the learner's active engagement "to grow a soul" (A. Powell Davies).

So, the question of our ministries is some, but less a matter of imparting wisdom than it is helping each member reflect deeply and broadly on her/his life experience. Ministry ought to focus on our willingness and ability to dialogue about the important questions of our days and lives. Here's a short list:

- \* **What am I called to "be" in this life?**
- \* **Whom or what do I serve that will outlast my lifetime?**
- \* **To whom am I accountable for how I lead my life?**
- \* **Is there a better way to be in relationship to my family, my neighbors, fellow congregates, and nature per se?**

No doubt, there is a great deal of knowledge and wisdom on all these questions that we can draw from others. Learning is a good thing. Yet, a most important part of our ministry is how we incorporate that wisdom into our lives so that we are transformed in some sense to our "better" if not "best" selves. No one can just pour that into you; it requires a community of rich conversation. It requires a vulnerability to being changed into a new being.

As none of us has it perfect yet, the work of spiritual discernment does indeed span our lives. Each day we have the opportunity, dare I say responsibility, to ask: What is my faithful response to this moment?

The times do call for some new ways of thinking and being. Together, our congregations are looking for that engagement. Bless those that are ministering faithfully to those in our congregations newly in need after losing a job or home. Bless those congregations reaching out into the community to serve many they do not know. Bless those challenging our social structures with a prophetic witness, calling anew for a more just economy.

After meeting as we can these urgent needs, there remain the questions of values. What is our Unitarian Universalist faithful response to these times? I look forward to hearing from you.

## **Growing the Beloved Community, Chapter 10: Nurture Stewards**

Are you a "keeper of the hall?" Are you a "long haul person"--one who tends responsibly to self, church, society, and the planet? You may be a steward!

Owen-Towle reminds us in this chapter to be good stewards and to cherish the ones we have --they are "steadfast servants through thick and thin, through personal regets, even through dislike and defeats, because their loyalty is never to eras or trends or personalities alone.(p. 74)." He zeroes in on church stewardship and on folks who "labor to keep their chosen religious community spiritually, financially, and programmatically afloat.(p. 74)." Where do you find yourself in terms of stewardship at Mosaic UU?

Citing generosity as one of UU's most ignored or underrated virtues, Owen-Towle reminds us that without it, we "love sparingly or stingily; our acts of justice happen rarely; and we hoard our gifts of time and soul and other resources (p. 75)."

What a mistake it is for us not to experience the joy of giving. Joyful givers are healthy and live longer; feel proud and empowered; are connected securely to the wider human family, which needs us; and enjoy a good investment--a generously supported church will be there when other enterprises have fallen by the wayside (p. 78). One Baptist minister said of Owen Towle's church in San Diego, "I don't agree with a lot of what you say and do, but I'm appreciative that you're always supporting causes that no other church in town will touch and welcoming folks no one else wants around (p. 79)." High praise in this Mosaican's opinion.

Are you a long haul person? Mosaic strives to grow a beloved community, a healthy, long-lived congregation. Mosaic, along with Owen-Towle, encourages all "to give not until it hurts but to give until it feels good--to give until it helps, to give until we're carrying our fair share of the financial load. We're beckoned to give until we can say with a clear conscience, 'All right, now that's a generous, responsible pledge to my faith community that's been so very good to me!' (p., 78-79)."

Refuge is something we turn to when we have a problem, but often the solutions we turn to give rise to new problems! As a preview to Refuge Ceremony, we will look at Buddha's teachings on how we can find meaningful and lasting solutions to problems. Also included is an introduction to Buddha's Tantric teachings, which help us identify with our pure potential rather than our limitations, in this way enabling us to make swift spiritual practice.

### **Grants for Lay Theological Education Available**

The Association Sunday website now has information about grants for Lay Theological Education. The Lay Theological Education Grants Program awards grants to UU congregations, districts and seminaries for projects focused on providing lay leaders with opportunities for spiritual growth and deeper theological understanding. The Taskforce is looking for activities and programs that offer more depth and challenge than a typical church's adult education classes, but are less arduous, expensive, and time-consuming than courses designed for divinity students.

There is about \$150,000 in total to provide in grants. Applications are being accepted now and will be accepted until October 1, 2009. Grants could be from \$1,000 to (theoretically) \$100,000. They anticipate most grant applications will be in the \$2,000 to \$10,000 range – go to [www.uua.org/giving/associationsunday/index.shtml](http://www.uua.org/giving/associationsunday/index.shtml)

Applications for larger amounts should provide much more detailed information than applications for smaller amounts. The form allows for that flexibility.

### ***Mosaic UU- A Welcoming Congregation?***

Don't we already consider ourselves welcoming? Last year, the Committee on Ministry (COM) adopted the goal of having Mosaic UU designated as a *Welcoming Congregation* by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). It became clear after initial research into the process of securing the designation that there is considerably more to do than the self-identification of being "welcoming". Even UU communities that perceive themselves as being progressive and open-minded carry considerable confusion, prejudice, and lack of understanding about bisexual, gay, lesbian, and trans gender people.

In 1989, the UUA's General Assembly voted overwhelmingly to initiate the *Welcoming Congregation* program to educate its members. Each congregation adapts the program to best meet its goals and each unique situation can bring positive changes to individuals and congregations. The process involves a year more or less of education, sensitivity training, integration of the needs of bisexual, gay, lesbian, and transgender people into the fabric of the congregation, and connection with existing community groups.

To accomplish this task, a steering committee of members and friends must be appointed to review the *Welcoming Congregation* materials from the UUA and prepare a plan to bring the congregation into accordance with the required standards of the formal designation. Working in collaboration with the Committee on Ministry, this 3-4 member committee will work towards the a plan which will be presented for congregational approval prior to submittal to The Office of Bisexual, Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender Concerns at the UUA.

## Our Green Earth Submitted by Lauren Griffin *Radical Simplicity*

Can we do it?

Imagine you are first in line at a potluck buffet. The spread includes not just food and water, but all the materials needed for shelter, clothing, healthcare, and education. How do you know how much to take? How much is enough to leave for your neighbors behind you—not just the six billion people, but the wildlife, and the as-yet-unborn?

Jim Merkel, author of [Radical Simplicity: Small Footprints on a Finite Earth](#), quit his job as a military engineer following the Exxon Valdez disaster and has since worked to develop tools for personal and societal sustainability.

In the face of looming ecological disaster, many people feel the need to change their own lifestyles as a tangible way of transforming our unsustainable culture. *Radical Simplicity* is the first book that guides the reader to a personal sustainability goal, then offers a process to monitor progress to a lifestyle that is equitable amongst all people, species, and generations. It employs three tools to help readers begin their customized journey to simplicity:

It builds on steps from [Your Money or Your Life](#) so readers can design their own personal economics to save money, get free of debt, and align their work with their values. It uses refined tools from [Our Ecological Footprint](#) so readers can measure how much nature is needed to supply all they consume and absorb their waste. Combining lyrical narrative, compassionate advocacy, and absorbing science, [Radical Simplicity](#) is a practical, personal answer to twenty-first century challenges that will appeal as much to Cultural Creatives and students as to spiritual seekers, policy makers, and sustainability professionals.

There is a hole in western consciousness and in our publications about the reality that western culture is ruining the planet. How do we as individuals make a new way? Interspersed with interesting, inspiring, thought-provoking world experience, philosophical musings and present-day challenges in carving a sustainable lifestyle, Merkel's book arrests the imagination of the reader. This book is moving toward concrete ways to "live as if life truly matters." 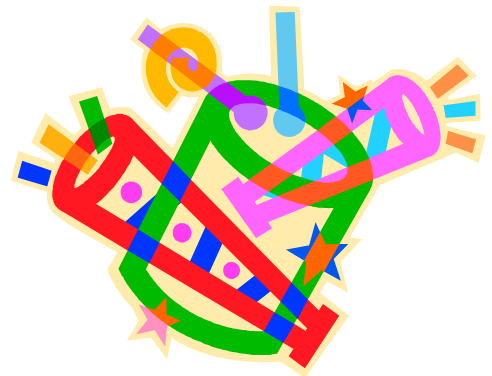
